My mother was a potter, and my father was a research chemist. He would buy the chemicals and together they would make their own glazes in our basement. Growing up, I was more interested in music than in ceramics and ended up being a professional musician in New York City. In retrospect I realize now that both of my parents contributed to my love of clay and my interest in glaze chemistry. I guess it was in my DNA after all!

Throughout my musical career, I also studied textile design and botanical illustration at Parsons and FIT. Taking classes at Earthworks Pottery in NYC and Sugar Maples in the Catskills did the trick. I found that I loved the feel and possibilities of clay,

and I've been addicted ever since. When my husband and I retired upstate, we added a studio to our house.

Pottery gives me the experience of shaping an idea into something tangible to hold, admire and use. My pieces are functional, with surface decoration inspired by botanical shapes and the natural world around me. I try for the organic freedom of movement in a brush stroke or the graphic look of a beautiful textile. Being in a community of potters is so important, and I am thankful that I found this welcoming organization.
